## IMPORTANT DATES:

- July 3 to Sept. 4 - REGISTER online or in person.
- Thursday, Sept. 12 - DELIVER Garden Produce entries to Mellor Hall between 10am and 5:30pm. Entries must be in place no later than 6 pm for judging.
- Sunday, Sept. 15 - PICK UP entries between 4:30-6:30pm. All Garden Produce entries must be collected that day. Any left after that date will be disposed of.
- Sept. $\mathbf{2 3}$ to $\mathbf{2 7}$ - COLLECT prize money and awards from the Office. Please bring entry tags with ribbons to verify placings.

## DIV. 14 RULES:

a. Entry fee is $\$ 1$ per entry. NEW! After Sept. 4, late fee is $\$ 2$.
b. Open to amateur, community and professional gardeners.
c. All produce must have been grown by the exhibitor.
d. Exhibits must be free from disease and insect injury.
e. Presentation - All entries must be shown in marketable (i.e. edible) condition. To ensure leafy vegetables look attractive throughout the show, display them in a container with water. Paper plates will be provided for other entries.
f. PLEASE READ THE CLASS DESCRIPTIONS CAREFULLY. The Exhibition will be using the BC Council of Garden Clubs' Horticulture Judging and Exhibiting Standards as its reference. There is a copy in the Exhibition Office.
g. An exhibitor may enter more than one entry per class provided each entry is a different variety/colour; identify if known.
h. Quantities and varieties must be as called for in the class, otherwise the exhibit will be disqualified. Naming the variety of the entry in the individual classes is an option. Identify the variety if known; print the name at the top of the Exhibit Tag or on a piece of paper attached to the tag.
i. On the judge's note, N.A.S. is Not According to Schedule.
j. A.O.V. refers to Any Other Variety.
k. Exhibitor's Pass: exhibitors may purchase a 3-day pass for $\$ 20$. Limit: 1 per exhibitor.

## Produce Presentation Tips

Before preparing your entries, please check this list to see how they should be presented for show.

- Beans ... stems should be left intact
- Beets ... trim tops to 2.5 cm , leave root intact
- Carrots ... trim tops to 1 cm , leave root intact
- Cauliflower ... stalk and larger leaves to be removed, trim remaining leaves just befow the level of the curd
- Corn ... remove husk lengthwise, trim shanks to 1 cm
- Cucumbers ... clean with the withered blossom absent
- Garlic ... clean, skin on, trim roots to 1 cm
- Kohlrabi ... trim roots and leaf stems close to the bulb
- Leeks ... shorten roots to 1 cm , trim tops so entry is $1 / 3$ white and 2/3 green
- Lettuce ... remove small or damaged outer leaves
- Onions ... trim roots and tops to 1 cm , remove any dirty outer scales, and do not wash
- Parsnips ... trim tops to 1cm, root tips may be shortened
- Peas ... leave stems attached
- Peppers ... leave stems on [note: spicy piquancy rated by SCHs or Scoville Heat Units]
- Potatoes ... brush off dry soil, DO NOT WASH
- Pumpkin ... leave stem intact
- Rhubarb ... trim leaves to 2.5 cm (fan shape), leave base intact
- Squash (summer) ... outer skin should not be hard or mature
- Squash (winter) ... leave stem intact
- Tomatoes ... remove stems
- Turnip ... trim tops to 1 cm , remove tap root just below the body

54. Swiss Chard - 5 leaves, display in container with water (rule e)
55. Tomatillo, with half or more of husk on, entry can be any colour -5 , one variety
56. Tomatoes, Cherry, Red, max. diameter $3 \mathrm{~cm}-1$ branch, with at least 5 fruit attached
57. Tomatoes, Cherry, not Red (yellow, orange, black, etc.), max. diameter $3 \mathrm{~cm}-1$ branch with at least 5 fruit attached
58. Tomatoes, Vine, multi-branch cluster, any variety -1 , longest cluster (truss). Winning entry will be determined by length.
59. Tomatoes, Red, medium, diameter less than $7.5 \mathrm{~cm}-3$
60. Tomatoes, Red, large, diameter 7.5 cm or greater -3
61. Tomatoes, Paste - 3
62. Tomatoes, Heirloom - 3

## CLASS \#

66. "Culinary Herbs" - 5 kinds, one bunch of each, tied, display in separate containers with water; please label. Table space $30 \mathrm{~cm} \times 30 \mathrm{~cm}\left[12 " \times 12^{\prime \prime}\right]$.
67. "Salad Bowl" - a collection of edibles (veggies, fruits and flowers) gathered for a salad. Present whole in a large bowl together with salad tongs or lifters, display leafy greens in water. Table space $30 \mathrm{~cm} \times 30 \mathrm{~cm}$ [12" $\times 12^{\prime \prime}$ ].
68. "Bounty of The Valley" - Use the Exhibition’s 2024 theme and colours, "One Smart Sheep" - Blueberry Blue, Snow Pea Green \& Winter White, as inspiration for your display. Fill a container (i.e. basket, box, barrel, wheelbarrow, etc.) with vegetables, fruits, nuts and herbs from your garden and orchard. Bounty must be predominantly fresh; it may include some preserved foods (i.e. pickles, jams, fruit leathers, honey). Place any leafy vegetable(s) in containers with water so they'll stay fresh for the duration of the Fair. Maximum table space: $60 \mathrm{~cm} \times 60 \mathrm{~cm}$ [ 24 " $\times 24$ "], take care that all parts of the display stay within the allotted space. PRIZES: 1st - \$100 | 2nd - \$75 | 3rd - \$50 | sponsored by The Old Farm Market, Duncan
